STANDARDS FOR GREEK LANGUAGE LEARNING

COMMUNICATION

Communicate in the Greek Language

- Ω Standard 1.1: Students engage in conversations, provide and obtain information, express feelings and emotions, and exchange opinions in the Greek language.
- Ω Standard 1.2: Students understand and interpret written and spoken language on a variety of topics
- Ω Standard 1.3: Students present information, concepts, and ideas to an audience of listeners or readers on a variety of topics.

CULTURES

Gain Knowledge and Understanding of the Greek Language

- Ω Standard 2.1: Students demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between the practices and perspectives of the Greek culture past and present.
- Ω Standard 2.2: Students demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between the products and perspectives of the Greek culture.

CONNECTIONS

Connect with Other Disciplines, Acquire Information, and Expand Knowledge

- Ω Standard 3.1: Students reinforce and further their knowledge of other disciplines and their historical development through the Greek language.

First Draft STANDARDS FOR GREEK TEACHER TRAINING AND CERTIFICATION 2-14-10

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Standard 1: Content Knowledge

Beginning Greek teachers demonstrate knowledge of Greek, proficiency in language skills necessary for teaching it, knowledge of Greek culture, and awareness of the importance of Greek language and culture in world civilizations of today and in the past.

Standard 2: Pedagogical Knowledge

Beginning Greek teachers demonstrate knowledge of the major approaches and methods used in the teaching of Greek culture. They understand the importance of assessment as attaining the objectives and are aware of a variety of approaches to it. They are familiar with national, state, and local curriculum standards. They acquire the skills and understanding necessary to put these approaches, methods, and standards into practice as they help their students develop connections and comparisons among languages and cultures. They begin the process of developing a well-thought-out, coherent understanding of the nature of teaching and learning.

Standard 3: Professional Development

Beginning Greek teachers know that the classroom is only a part of the teacher's professional life. They have begun to continue their intellectual development as life-long learners of Greek. They take advantage of opportunities beyond the classroom for continuous professional development. The Greek adage of "Forever Excelling" makes their programs and the richness and excitement of Greek culture known to a wider community beyond the classroom.
